I was going to mention the mural. I would like to add, if you haven't looked at it, go take a look at it. That's in celebration of our 100th anniversary. So we are excited to have that. We recently got added to the Alabama Mural Trail, if y'all knew there was a mural trail.

Anyway, we've enjoyed having that up there. And it really does make a nice attraction and addition to the building, which needs all the help it can get.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: As we were talking, when they were doing the mock -the mural dedication the other day, it helps you find this building much easier than looking for a sign out front. It's a billboard all along the whole entire side of the building, so it looks great.

Go ahead.

MR. WALDREP: Okay. I'm here to speak on behalf of the piece of property in front of you there. I purchased this property, and it's right almost directly behind my house. But Natchez Trace -- the piece of property I purchased was approximately 70 acres of land, and the Natchez Trace cuts the property. And it cuts this 17 acres off, which puts it on the west side of the Natchez Trace. And so one side of it is blocked by Natchez Trace, and the other two sides of the triangle are completely surrounded by Forever Wild. And I would also mention the access road to all of the Forever Wild on that west side of Natchez Trace, in that part of the Forever Wild allotment in Freedom Hills, goes through this 17 acres of property. I would offer it to the board, just -- I couldn't buy the property without buying the entire spot. I tried. That's really all I've got

However, we are in the process of

closing my mother's estate, and my sister has children that want to return to our area and build next to us. The problem is the point which we landlock Forever Wild on this property is -- for you to have water access to it, you would need some of the point that's along the east side of the bay. And what we'd like do is swap the -- I think it's two and a half acres at the end of the bay, for some setback land on the acreage up, you know, where we all live.

So I understand it was brought to the board last meeting and that there was questions and concerns, but, you know, we did not attend. We were told it was not necessary if we turned in all this information. So I'm here to answer any questions or concerns you guys may have.

And we know that we have to pay for all the survey changes. It won't cost Forever Wild anything. And I think that Forever Wild is starting to let people onto the

1	property on the west side of the tract.

17	Forever Wild was considering this tract.
18	And I came to the last meeting because I
19	think there was a move to do a first
20	appraisal. And I was simply showing up to
21	understand where we're at and what it is,
22	so I can tell her information that's

useful. And I wasn't just quite sure what

1 happens next or where we're at. It may be 2. on the agenda today, so I'm not sure if you 3 have a definite answer. But if it's 4 something to be discussed today, that's 5 what I came to listen to and understand. 6 CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Sure. glad to briefly explain where that is in 8 the process. So first appraisal has been 9 done on the piece of property. It is up, available for the board to consider a 10 11 second appraisal and move to purchase if they so desire. It is in the list of 12 13 properties they can consider today. 14 MR. BUNN: That's the answer for 15 that. Thank you very much. 16 CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Thank you. 17 For the record, I want to note that Ms. Stanley has joined us so she can be 18 19 counted as present on the -- for the 20 minutes.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: I don't want to cut anybody off if they have a desire to share their three minutes.

(Off the record.)

MS. MCCURDY: Commissioner, there is somebody here. I'll go ahead and tell you the tract as I understand it. If y'all want to go ahead and be turning there, it's the Upper Delta WMA, Stiggins Lake Addition. That's Tab 4B, page 9.

Sir, you can come on up.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: For the record, this is Mr. Ed Travis on the Tab 4B, page 9, Upper Delta, Stiggins Lake Addition. Just take one as she's passing those out.

All right, sir. Go ahead.

MR. TRAVIS: First of all, I appreciate the opportunity to come before this board and to represent some information to the citizens of the state. I've been in positions kind of like you

1 guys are now where we were looking at land 2. trust issues and accepting conservation 3 easement. So I've been around the -- I 4 think it's important for everyone to know that not only the presentation of the 5 6 property and how critical it might be, but also to give some credibility to the 8 presenter, who are representatives of the 9 landowners, and our background. You'll notice that I used to serve on a board with 10 11 a quite a few members that were on this 12 board at one time. But I've been around 13 with -- as a consulting forester in real 14 estate and appraiser for a long time and 15 served on the Alabama Forest Resource 16 Center, which it used to be, but it's now a 17 different entity, the TREASURE Forest Board and other things. And I've been involved 18 19 over many years in forest management and 20 appraisal of these kind of wild places. 2.1 Some of them -- and it goes to my memory now, I actually worked on the Wehle 22 23 property before it came into the state,

Grand Bay Savanna, the Sandhill Crane
Refuge, Mobile Delta. We did some timber
work and also appraisal work on the
Splinter Hill Bog.

So we've got some unique background in working with these kind of asset classes. But the Stiggins Lake tract, the most important thing here is the Mobile-Tensaw Delta. And for those that are not familiar with the Mobile-Tensaw Delta, it's probably one of the most significant watersheds in the whole United States. Ιt has importance from many biological, ecological reasons to the citizens of the state and also to the United States as a whole. So this is an excellent location, and Forever Wild already owns some land adjacent to it. So it's kind of one of the few private inholdings left in that system with this significance.

We have a timber inventory that we've done on it, which is not included in this information, which we can provide. It is a

unique timber stand condition. It's a large, big area, close to 700 acres of tupelo gum cypress that's mature. It has been forested over many years. And a -- when you're looking at a bottomland hardwood system, most of the time it really doesn't peak out until it's 80 to 100 years old. So a year here and there is not a whole lot of change. But it's a long-term asset class that has special considerations that have to be -- used to deal with.

It has some boat access from Mount
Vernon and Hubbard Landing in Baldwin
County. And all this tract is actually in
Baldwin County, but it fronts on the Mobile
River, on each side of the Mobile River.

We have offered to have you guys consider the possibility of purchasing this. We're also going out to the free world for whoever might be interested. My job is to represent the landowners and market this property to the best interest.

In this material you'll have a lot of

location maps and aerial photographs. And if the citizens want to go see this package, you can go to the Internet, to our web site. And there's a full -- the same presentation is there if you wanted to look at it.

We have a timber stand map that we did. Like I said, it's a very diverse tract. It's -- there's some photographs of the various conditions, and it's something you can't do a whole lot with in three minutes. I've about run out of time.

I did want to say it's good to see a few of you I know here from past, and we hope and trust that you guys will consider this property of being worth the Forever Wild consideration.

I don't guess we take questions or anything from --

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Are there any questions from the board?

Mr. Jones?

MR. JONES: Yes, I notice in your

literature that you're not conveying the mineral rights. Is the landowner keeping the mineral rights?

MR. TRAVIS: I don't even know if we own any -- no, that's the great science.

You never know whether you have -- I'm not even sure of the mineral interest that we own. Normally, we try to reserve all of them in a location like that, but it's always negotiable. I'm not even sure -- the title search would determine what your minerals are. You might own one third, but when it comes down to it, you own one third of one-thirty-second of some kind of weird interest. So that's a consideration we have to talk about.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Mr. Parnell?

MR. PARNELL: Yes, sir. Could you give us a little history of the property and how long the current owners have owned it and that type thing?

MR. TRAVIS: Yes, sir. The current owners acquired title to it within, I

1	think, the last year.
2	Keith, is that right?
3	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Year and a
4	half.
5	MR. TRAVIS: It has been in the same
6	family ownership probably 70 to 80 years
7	prior to that. As part and there was
8	some internal, let's say, separation
9	between some of the family entities. And
LO	some of them retained certain parts of it.
L1	Some of the interests were separated, and
L2	that's how it ended up this way. It's been
L3	under the same pattern of use for since
L 4	it was created.
L5	It's a special place, no question
L6	about it.
L7	Question?
L8	MR. HARPER: Mr. Travis, you know
L9	there's a discrepancy on the acres, what
20	we've got and you've got. This 1679 is the
21	acres that you're offering to sell?
22	MR. TRAVIS: Yes, sir, that's what

MR. HARPER: At this price?

MR. TRAVIS: Yeah. And that of course -- the timber component is where there's a big chunk of this price. And that would be something that y'all would have to consider and we would investigate and do the due diligence you need to.

Ouestions from the floor?

MS. MCCURDY: It looks like our maps are very close between the map that you have and what we've just received in the packet. So I think we can work together to clarify the difference, about a 20-acre or 22-acre difference. We will figure that out, but the shape looks very similar to what you have and what's in --

MR. TRAVIS: I might add that in our exhibit, some of the tax map overlays in Alabama and Mississippi are not always correct. So a lot of these imagery will show an overlay based on a tax map configuration, and there's a jog in this particular one that the survey -- you guys have copies of the survey, so you'll be

able to see that survey has been somewhat dated. But it's a survey, and that's a unique thing to have down in that area.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Dr. Saloom?

DR. SALOOM: Ed, thank you for your presentation. Can you speak to the access to this piece of property?

MR. TRAVIS: Yes, sir. The access to this property is mainly by boat access for the public. Forever Wild has always owned adjacent land, and over the years there has been access to this property by road for management purposes. Of course, when Scott Paper owned a lot of the Clearwater property up there. You guys have a unique position in terms of being able to do things that the third-world public may not be able to do by your joining ownership. And this property has been logged -- like I said, an 80- to 100-year-old forest. There's old roads in there. So it has been -- had forest operations. And when Scott Paper, of course, had their barge and

helicopter fleet operation, that was -but, you know, in 100 years stand of
timber, a lot of economic and biological
changes impact an ownership. There's always
something about that that does come into
play, and we recognize that.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Did you have

MS. MCCURDY: No. I was going to ask
Mr. Travis after the meeting to get
together on the acreage and get the willing
seller letter corrected -- the acreage
correct, we'll figure that out and get that
corrected on the nomination.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Dr. Powers.

DR. POWERS: I don't know if it's appropriate. Tell me if it's more of a general discussion. But I'd like to hear from Chuck on the WMA there, whether it's a popular WMA. I see the score is fairly high.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Chuck?

DR. POWERS: And if he needs to

investigate it more, that's fine.

MR. SYKES: Thank you, Dr. Powers. I had a meeting with my chiefs yesterday, and Keith specifically pointed out he's worked a lot down there. And he said this would be an excellent addition to the WMA. It is very popular. And it does close a hole that would cut down on a lot of the boundary markings and things like that to make things simpler.

MR. OATES: Do you know what the total acreage of this wildlife management area is?

MR. SYKES: Not right off the top of my head, I don't.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: Thank you, sir.

I think that's all the public comment that we have. Now it's time for us to talk about going into executive session. By regulation, appraisal values are confidential during periods of negotiation. Accordingly, in order to discuss tract

MS. MCCURDY: That is me. For the board, if you would, we're going to do our usual run through of financial information. You'll have in your green folder slightly updated financial information. Our meeting being on the first is a little unusual. But we did some in that slightly updated information in your green folder.

What I always like to do first is run through the current status of the funding available, if you desire to make any motions towards acquisitions and also just generally update the board and the public on the status of nominations that have been previously motioned by the board for staff to proceed for acquisition.

So the properties that we have somewhere in the closing process based on this board -- motions to the board are the Bon Secour River Wetlands Addition in Baldwin County; Heron Bay Wetlands Addition, Mobile County; Sipsey River Swamp-Brownville Addition, Tuscaloosa

County; Skyline WMA-Fowler Cove Addition,
Jackson. And we are also working on what
is a 100 percent donation that we discussed
at the last meeting, so that's not
reflected here because it was not -- it was
not a purchase but an acceptance of a
donation.

So with all that being said, the unencumbered balance for the board, taking all that into account, is about \$25.5 million of what's available to the board.

And that is within the budgetary authority.

Since our last -- well, let's see,
this fiscal year -- I keep up with closings
by fiscal year. So for this fiscal year so
far we've had two closings. The John
Moss -- John Doss Mountain Addition, and
the Oak Mountain State Park-Belcher
Addition, phase two. We've had those two
closings to date.

So that's a picture of what you have available. If there are no questions, I

will move on to the next report.

All right. Next, I wanted to provide an update to the board on the status of our stewardship fund. We had -- the board had previously motioned for a stewardship fund in the amount of \$2.5 million to be available for expenditures this year. Currently, we've spent just over 400,000. We're still fine. We think we're within what the board has asked us to do with the money we have available. If you'll also look on Tab 2C, you'll see in conjunction with that, the standard report that we received from the state treasurer's office related to the investments that they place and manage for the board within the stewardship fund.

MS. STANLEY: I just want to note, I think this page three has a typo. It says, Net assets as of December 31, 2024. And I'm pretty sure you mean 2023 at the bottom left of that.

MS. MCCURDY: We sure do. Thank you.

Although, that would be okay at the end of 2024. But, yes, that date and that figure is reflected in Tab 2C that the State Treasurer provides. It shows the last compiled number we have from them as net assets being just under \$46 million. Thank you, Ms. Stanley, for that.

MS. STANLEY: You're welcome.

MS. MCCURDY: I appreciate it.

Those are the usual financial reports that we go through. If there are no questions, I'll move on to tab three, into the appraised nominations.

MR. HARPER: Are any of -- is any of the supplies being used for hog traps?

MS. MCCURDY: Yes, sir. And we'll circle back to that in the miscellaneous section. We have a short -- a brief report, but a little bit of a report, on the hog eradication efforts.

Any additional questions?

MS. MCCURDY: All right. So if you

would again, we will go to Tab 3, Tab 3A.

And so this is -- each meeting I run

through the status of every tract that is

pending that the board had asked the staff

to pursue appraisal work on. And that's

what I'm going to do now and let you know

what's available for this meeting, if you

would like to take additional actions

towards purchase, and then what's still in

the works.

The appraisals that we have in hand include the following: Blackwater River SOA-Clapper Addition, Baldwin County; Cathedral Cavern State Park-Gurley Drive Addition, Marshall County; Historic Blakeley State Park-Pye Addition, Baldwin County; Lillian Swamp Blackwater Addition in Baldwin County.

And as an update both for the board and the public, this nomination has been slightly revised. This tract originally had two detached parcels, the northern parcel and the southern parcel. The

southern parcel is no longer available. So what has -- stands appraised and available to the board is the northern tract within that original nomination.

And the staff -- any time we have a change in the nomination, the staff again reviews that nomination to be sure that nothing has changed that alters the scoring of that tract, that it should have been on the shortlist, it would still be on the shortlist, and no acreage change has impacted tract access, the intended recreational usage, or possibly loss of a habitat that was to be the conservation focus. The staff has performed that evaluation. This tract is rightfully still available to the board, still would be on the shortlist originally. So, again, that one is available.

I now want to run through the tracts that are in some stage of appraisal work based on the board's motion, but we do not have those back in hand so they're not

available to the board for additional action this meeting. Those appraisals are for the following tracts: Davidson Creek Tract, Coosa County; Red Hills-Section 23, Monroe County; Red Hills-Swift Addition, Monroe County; West Fowl River Tract, Mobile County.

I do need to update the board. You had previously asked for us to appraise the Coldwater Mountain-Oxanna Addition up in Calhoun County. We no longer have a willing seller on that tract. That tract is no longer available to the board. So we did not make any move towards appraisal on that, obviously, but did want you to know why you're not seeing and why you will not see it on a future list.

If there are no questions on the status of the tracts that are on the appraised nomination list, I will keep moving.

1 MS. MCCURDY: Okay. If you would, we 2. now will run through our grant status memo, 3 which is Tab 5A in your packets. I'll give 4 you a chance to get to Tab 5A. I'm going to run through the tracts that are 5 6 benefiting or could benefit from some amount of leverage funding, partnership 8 funding, grant funding, just so you're 9 aware of those. We have -- the tracts that 10 are already in the closing process, just 11 again to remind you that we are taking advantage of leverage funds. We have the 12 13 Bon Secour River Wetlands Addition in 14 Baldwin County that I mentioned was in 15 closing. That was a National Coastal 16 Wetlands Conservation Grant Program award 17 that we're leveraging in that one. still have pending the Skyline WMA-Fowler 18 19 Cove Addition. This was an offer of a 20 potential partnership between Chuck's 2.1 Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries division, 22 and their Pittman-Robertson funding, and

As to the nominations that are somewhere in the appraisal process that I just went through, we have the Blackwater River SOA-Clapper Addition. This was another opportunity to partner with the Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries division on the 25 -- 75/25 split acquisition, also a Pittman-Robertson opportunity. We have certain funding available we anticipate to be a 25 percent -- 75/25 split opportunity with Red Hill-Section 23 Addition. Also, Wildlife has the opportunity to utilize some of its Section 6 RLA funding on the Red Hills-Swift Addition.

And as an update, the West Fowl River tract, I mentioned to the board in our last meeting that State Lands has been given the opportunity -- gotten an invitation from NOAA to submit a grant proposal related to acquisition of that tract. If awarded, it would provide 100 percent of the funding, the acquisition funding. We thought we

might have an award about now, but it looks like it's going to be closer -- an award announcement, but it looks like it's going to be closer to the summer on that. But we will keep you up-to-date as soon as we get word if that's been awarded.

Moving to the shortlist nominations, the Dugdown Mountain Corridor, I think we have some encouraging feedback. So I'm going to give the honor to Mr. Oates.

MR. OATES: Thank you, Patti. You know we've been talking about this one for quite a while. It's a legacy grant that we put in a couple years -- two or three years ago. We've now gotten word that we're on the list. We haven't seen the list, and we haven't gotten an actual award letter yet. But we're confident enough that this is going to go forward that we are moving forward with the appraisal. And it's -- I can't explain the whole process, but it's called the Yellow Book Appraisal, but it's a little more complicated than our regular

appraisals. We're going to go ahead and move forward with that appraisal for this property and expect to see the award letter, Darcy, maybe the end of February.

That related to a National Fish and Wildlife Foundation Cumberland Plateau, Southern Appalachian Fund Award. So we are using some funding to leverage Forever Wild stewardship funds to establish -- support establishment of a shortleaf pine forest

And then we are in the process of getting with an architect to produce the drawings that we need for the improvements that would relate to the Mobile-Tensaw Delta Bartram and Perdido River Canoe Trails Improvement Project. That was a Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act, or GOMESA, award that was received by the governor. It is on acreage other than Forever Wild, but there will be some enhancements occurring on Forever Wild acreage. So I'm going to keep the board abreast of those, that process and those improvements.

Unless there are questions on grants --

MS. MCCURDY: I'm going to ask Chuck. Chuck, if it's not you, someone on your

MS. MCCURDY: Well, that was a federal bill, but it allotted money to various agencies. EPA, NOAA was one -also one of the agencies. NOAA elected to institute a competitive program limited to its Coastal Zone Management programs and National Estuarine Research Reserves of which our department, the two, the State Lands division -- the commissioner has two -- has both of those programs in Alabama. And so that is the -- it's still competitive among those programs, but it's locked in to the states that have either Coastal Zone Management or the National Estuarine Research Reserves. So that's what we were invited through. There's some additional money through that bill that is

more broadly competitive to nonprofits, universities, and other organizations. We're working with them down that pipe.

MS. MCCURDY: If there are none, then I would get you to go to Tab 4. going run through the shortlist. And so, also for the benefit of the public, pursuant to Amendment 543 that formed the program, all tracts that are nominated to the program must be evaluated. And we are -- we come up with what we term in our language as a shortlist or priority list of tracts based upon scoring and staff evaluation. We have different staff members that score these tracts in State Parks, WMA, or SOA opportunities, general recreation, and then nature preserves, or really just any type of habitat conservation work. They're scored in those categories.

We then take those scores, and we --

the nominations compete in their district; the northern, central, and southern. And we take the top three scoring tracts by district in each of the four categories that I've mentioned to produce the shortlist. Tracts may score in more than one, top three in more than one, which starts shortening your list, and some of these you'll see that on.

2.

We also have had some nominations that have not had willing seller letters returned or have been removed for consideration. Also, we do -- we're trying to evaluate these tracts to be sure that the ones that do shortlist and come before the board do represent a viable opportunity.

Our list this time looks oddly short. That happens sometimes by all those factors. I'll say -- I'll mention it again a little bit later. But in our last review of the last fiscal year, we were still at what has been a pretty constant 15 percent

figure comparing nominations that come in to tracts that close. So only about 15 percent of the nominations we receive work their way through and end up in a closing. At least for last fiscal year that has stayed consistent. We'll see as we go forward if this shorter list is -- if this time it's a blip or if we're moving into having shorter lists. There are several factors that I mentioned I think led to this one being shorter this time.

MS. STANLEY: As I was looking at the scoring -- I want to thank the staff for all the work. I know there's a lot that goes into those numbers that we have on this list. But is there a goal number? Would 100 be the perfect piece of land that we should definitely vote yes on? Help me with the range of numbers.

MS. MCCURDY: I will. It is very, very true that, yes, that is -- the higher the number, the better, the more attractive that it is. Aspects of our scoring take

into consideration things like access, 1 2. where it's located, management cost, how we 3 would use it. There are certain unknowns, 4 though, that is really where the board's expertise and discretion comes in. For 5 6 example, you may have a tract somewhere that we don't have any other acreage. If 8 you ask me, I'll have to tell you, Sure, 9 that's going to increase our management 10 cost, but the board may feel that's an 11 important area of the state that isn't 12 represented in the acreage, and therefore, 13 you're willing to go there and we go there. 14 We don't want to keep that type of an 15 opportunity off your available list. There 16 may also be a parcel that is very critical 17 because it does solidify or help us with access or takes out an easement. As that 18 19 little tract by itself, if you view it in a 20 vacuum, it may not be as great a score, but 2.1 it scores high enough to be on here, it may 22 be very valuable for that reason.

So I will say what we're trying to do

in our review is progressively take off the tracts. We call it "zero out" the ones that are just not -- do not have a viable positive potential impact for the board, for the program in light of what may become board priority. You're going to see some at times that score -- make the shortlist, but you're not sure either why it's low or it's high. If that makes -- a long way around, but that's where we need the board's input and discretion and just where you want the program to go. We try to leave you open the opportunities that are viable but not burden you with the ones that just are not going to work or have no value that we can find.

I wanted to provide a bit of an update since our last meeting, our planning and activities are ongoing. But I wanted to provide a brief overview to the board of some of the activities we've been involved in related to feral hog mitigation and management efforts related to -- across our tracts to that problem.

2.

And we -- the board had previously noted and requested that we have available up to \$1 million as needed to use wisely, but as needed, to implement additional measures. So I wanted to run through the first phase of what I would call the purchase of traps and the tracts that we have prioritized getting them on. And also as we bring on some contract services, we will still be on many of the tracts purchasing the tracts -- excuse me, purchasing the traps on those tracts. But I wanted to run through -- currently, as of

1 when I did the memo anyway, had purchased 2. 35 traps that were in some portion of our 3 accounting acquisition and delivery 4 process. And those 35 will be placed 5 across some tracts I'll name here in a 6 second. Those systems are the usual cell camera corral trap systems, and we also 8 have some cameras that are being added for 9 the purposes of monitoring. Again, trying 10 to ensure that we don't have an emerging 11 problem somewhere, that we'll spot it 12 quickly. And I want to run through the 13 traps. Again, this is -- I don't mean to 14 say this is exhaustive, but this is what 15 the first phase of implementation has been. That has been the Lauderdale WMA; Freedom 16 17 Hills WMA, both in Colbert and Lauderdale 18 Counties for those two tracts; the Mulberry 19 Fork WMA which crosses Walker and 20 Tuscaloosa; our Sipsey Complex in 2.1 Tuscaloosa County; Fort Toulouse, Elmore 22 County; our Forever Wild Field Trial area 23 where a lot of our youth hunts, disabled

hunts, and sporting events occur; the Old
Cahawba Tract in Dallas County; Portland
Landing and Rum Creek tracts, also in
Dallas County; Barbour WMA which crosses
Barbour and Bullock; Red Hills WMA, Monroe
County; Thigpen Hill in Butler; Grand Bay
Savanna, Mobile; and then the Mobile-Tensaw
Delta Complex which stretches across Mobile
and Baldwin Counties.

We also continue with -- as you may recall, we had contractor services that assisted us to formulate what we thought would be some costs to present to the board and also help us understand how we might interact with contractors. We've used a group to help us on Thigpen and on our Old Cahawba tract, kind of to get a grasp of some of the numbers we brought to you before. We're utilized some spending authority we had in our purchasing system on that to just proceed on with work at Thigpen Hill. That is a tract that we are concentrating on and beginning to work

1 through a recreational plan for, so we went 2. ahead, and we do have an issue there. 3 we concentrated some of those leftover 4 efforts. But we also -- and I want to thank Charlanna Skaggs, our general 5 6 counsel, and the commissioner who were very helpful to me and my staff on working on an 8 RFP, a request for proposal, similar to 9 what you saw with our appraiser contracts. 10 And so we're wrapping that up and will 11 similarly provide that to the board. 12 there are vendors that you'd like to have 13 respond to that once we get it finalized 14 and approved through the state for 15 issuance, that should be pretty soon. 16 get that to y'all, and you can let anybody 17 else know in addition to our contacts. That is, of course, posted through the 18 19 state system, but I want to be sure y'all have or know landowners that are 20 2.1 particularly pleased with certain groups, 22 that we -- that the groups are aware of the 23 opportunity.

That's a brief overview. I want to thank my staff and let me say Chuck's staff and my wildlife staff and Lands staff that have done a lot of work on this in figuring out next steps and what to do. And we'll continue to update you.

MR. HARPER: Ms. Patti, are these ranked in any way? They all have problems, I assume. But are they ranked by severity or anything?

MS. MCCURDY: They're not in -- this first phase, I would not say is internally ranked, other than this is both where we thought there was a need and also where we thought we could move sort of quickly where we think we know where we're going or know where we're going to put the traps and go ahead and hit the ground. So I don't have them ranked independently. I actually put them in more of a loose geographical order to present to you. These were identified as to where both staff wanted to move quickly and get some traps and also where -- in

some places we're setting the traps, we're handling the traps ourselves in the interim of getting contractor services.

2.

MR. HARPER: My question -- I had a landowner requesting help in north Escambia, Monroe County. Is that Red Hill?

MS. MCCURDY: Yes, sir.

MR. HARPER: That's the area? Okay. Thank you.

DR. POWERS: So in the last point here you said RFP for statewide contractual services. So you're not talking about just one? So it'll work more like your appraisal where you're trying to identify a pool of people and then each opportunity they would tell you a price on.

MS. MCCURDY: I don't want to presuppose what we will receive or how those will be evaluated. But we're open to and looking for either some -- an entity that can provide statewide or it does need -- we're sort of tied to our respondents.

And so until we see kind of what we get

and whether they can go statewide or need to be focused geographically, but the end result is that we want to cover statewide, either with one or more.

DR. POWERS: All right. And the second thing is it's always on these -- for any invasive species or any problematic species, it's always hard to judge the efficacy or success of your actions. Are you going to have anything in here beyond just body count that judges that? I mean, you have cameras so you can look at before and after. Just because you remove so many doesn't mean -- doesn't mean you have to -- or you are successful, or you just still are not seeing a difference between before and after, so you know you need to get more management and more removals in there. Is that going to be part of the process?

MS. MCCURDY: Yes, we will have access -- one thing the pictures will help show is that, too, you want to -- you don't want to pull the trap door, so to speak,

before you have the picture seen in there. 1 2. You don't want to -- just because one is in 3 there, you don't want to drop the trap. It 4 will help us evaluate how the contractors are doing and how we're doing. But, yeah, 5 6 we're -- you're correct in that it is a difficult -- if you are not seeing any, 8 you're sure hoping it's because you're 9 doing well. If you are seeing them, are 10 you technically pulling them off somebody 11 else's property. It doesn't matter. We've 12 got them in our trap. We've killed them 13 and they're gone. But as I said before, 14 I'm not going to mislead the board, that it 15 is -- other than watching these traps to 16 see when you've got one in there, that 17 you're dropping the door at the right time 18 and not prematurely.

> DR. POWERS: I would just like some study to see if it's successful or needs to do more because it may be you knock down that population, and all you've done is create more opportunities for the young.

And really, you're not -- you know, the population could compensate for all of those removals unless you really hit it hard. And without that information, that before and after and some monitoring, it's hard to adaptively manage your removals and things like that.

MS. MCCURDY: Right. And I do think that, again, the population, unless you somehow -- we find a way that nobody else has to be sure that we get every one from everywhere, the population will continue. I will combine with my staff and Wildlife and try to see if we can give you some feedback other than monitoring the cameras and monitoring the numbers. And with the additional recommendations of those who work in the private sector as to trap placement, as to populations that we're seeing, I've -- you know, it will be somewhat of a loose science. I'm not going to mislead you. But I will ask my staff and Wild -- Chuck's staff to get together

And the dollar that we brought -- dollar figures we brought before the board and you granted us was really to give you an idea of what we thought based on some of the assistance that we would get through contract service and input from those providers, what would be for our first year's efforts. Dr. Valentine?

DR. VALENTINE: We learned a lot from marine protected areas and how things move a lot between things. And what I'm hearing are defined boundaries for Forever Wild property. You're going to have to consider the input of wild hogs from the surrounding owners' property as well. This is a long-term project. It's not going to be a snapshot.

MS. MCCURDY: No, absolutely not.

And that's why, you know, we are -- that's what we're -- wherever they come from, if we kill them, that will be great. It will be a positive.

CHAIRMAN BLANKENSHIP: I think this is like a lot of the other stuff. We are just going to have to do some adaptive management of it. We will start with the million dollars with these traps, with these contractors, and provide data on what they're seeing in different places and for the different tracts. We'll have a good idea moving forward whether -- the traps will be owned by us. We'll continue to employ those with what we need to come back to the board with, for additional requests for funding in the future. This is the first time we're doing this with contractors and this method, with this first million dollars. DR. VALENTINE: I wonder if it might not be useful to have some sort of outreach built around this effort and see what the surrounding property owners are also saying and what they're running into.

MS. MCCURDY: Yes. And I think our ground staff does currently communicate with surrounding landowners. I know that Mr. Harper and I worked on -- called me on something that unbeknownst, frankly, to a landowner and to me, based on our conversation, the landowner staff and my staff had already been working on the issue and worked through the problem and had a great communication already going on as far as having that landowner have access they needed to fight their problem on their acreage.

So I think that our staff will make an extra effort to be in touch with the surrounding landowners. That's ongoing.

there was an article last week concerning this efforts. But appreciation for the board for what they provided for this work, and from that we've had a landowner adjacent to one of our properties that came up and met with me last week to talk about -- happy to see what we're doing and help provide input on how he thought it would be successful close to his property. The outreach effort from the article did reach some folks.

1 and everybody up there is very, very 2. excited about the ribbon cutting tomorrow. 3 The actual grand opening to the public 4 will be Saturday. But this tract is a fabulous example of Forever Wild's money on 5 6 acquisition and some money assisting with trails and site conditions being far 8 leveraged -- further by City of Springville 9 funding and the time of their staff and having trails put in, in St. Clair County 10 11 and trail work -- significant parking lot 12 work to really get this open to the public. 13 They've had several businesses in the area 14 that have contributed time, money, and 15 equipment to getting the work done and 16 getting the trails in place and getting 17 this open to the public. So the commissioner will be at, of many of his 18 19 recent ribbon cuttings, will be at the City 20 of Springville tomorrow. And if anyone 2.1 needs information on that, again, at 1:00. 22 If you need directions, just let me know. 23 But the trail system is going to

incorporate hiking, biking, horseback opportunities, paddling, bird watching, and -- paddling in a good way -- bird watching and enjoyment of -- really it's, we say, an aesthetic beauty. But it really is a beautiful tract and really well done. I want to thank my staff in addition to the city and county and all the volunteers. We had volunteer groups helping us. That's just a great example of everybody working together.

I'll move on to tab -- next would be 5K. I have a memo, I think, in the last packet also. But I wanted to kind of give you an ongoing update to some of our student recruitment and collegiate mentoring efforts. That is an ADCNR program, and Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries is very involved in that. And I think we've talked about their efforts before. But that is a program that is really designed to introduce students to outdoor recreation opportunities but also

conservation careers and on-the-ground understanding of both the strategy and the implementation of various habitat and wildlife land management efforts. And so within that program, one of the goals is to also be sure that those opportunities are provided to historically black colleges and universities. We also do want to be sure those students are encouraged further in understanding the career opportunities that are out there and hopefully interest them and want to pursue them once they had an opportunity to learn more about them.

I also talked with Dr. Powers after the last meeting, and we're working on some opportunities also with the University of South Alabama students we'll keep you up to date on. But we have had -- at our Forever Wild Field Trial Area in Hale County, we had a waterfowl workshop and wing shooting clinic, actually toward the end of last fiscal year. So students from both Montevallo and Tuskegee stayed at the

And then they came back again the middle of December, December 19th through the 21st, and took advantage of being on-site with ADCNR biologists and conservation enforcement officers who both reviewed them. Some of the strategies that have been discussed at previous meetings and then were able to go out and demonstrate some of the successful outcomes of those activities being implemented.

We are continuing to schedule efforts. We don't have an exhaustive list. We're working with the universities and building on these. But I can go ahead and let you know of a few upcoming events. Alabama A&M and Tuskegee students will be staying at our Wehle Land Conservation Center, similar to the field trial area that is a partnership between Forever Wild and the State Lands division at those facilities. But those students will be there February 2nd through the 4th, and

they're going to be staying with us and learning about our facility but also using our facility as a drop -- sort of a jump-off point for some off-site hunting opportunities.

Tuskegee University students, through a cooperative effort of many organizations, which include the Minority Outdoor
Alliance, Quail Forever, and Pheasants
Forever, will be staying also at Wehle

those students. And then Tuskegee students
will be back at the field trial area in
April. They're going to be sort of what we
call the Fishing 101 and pond management
